Study of the behavior and development of young children through direct, systematic observation of children in selected situations and comparison with established child development theories and data.

# 1. Participation/Weekly Activities/Discussions:

You will be expected to actively participate in class by asking questions, answering questions, and participating in group activities. There may be activities and discussions during various classes to check your knowledge. You may lose points if you are late to class or leave early and thus miss an activity or discussion. Being on time is part of the expectation of professionalism for this class. Be sure to have read the assigned readings before class.

### 2. At Home Activities (6):

You will be expected to complete some activities at home during some classes. These activities may include watching a video, reading an article, viewing a presentation, responding to posed questions, participating in online class discussions, writing a short paper, etc.

# 3. Observation Practice (19):

You will be responsible for reading assigned chapters from the text and responding to video vignettes from each chapter. The purpose of the practice observations is to give practical experiences with assessment of young children. This will be your opportunity to show you understand each of the methods and can connect your observations with the Early Learning Standards. You may be given time to begin your reflections in class; be sure to bring your journal to all class sessions. Your entries will be graded based on the quality of your response and your ability to synthesize the things you have learned.

### 3. Reflection (9):

You are to respond to the Reflection at the end of each chapter with at least 200 words each.

# 4. Finding Your Observation Style (9):

You are to respond to the Finding Your Observation Style at the end of each chapter with at least 200 words each.

#### 5. Final Presentation:

You will develop a final presentation using the information learned from the video observations and how you have/will relate that to the children you work with. In your summary you will want to introduce your child/children as well as give a summary of what you discovered about yourself as it relates to completing observations and assessments. Be sure to include the five Developmental Domains from the Wisconsin Model Early Learning Standards along with suggestions on how to facilitate his/her development as well as any other conclusions or recommendations you might have.

**Assessment of Student Learning:** A composite of activity rubrics will be used to assess artifacts from this course and may be added to CMN's teacher education portfolio.
