To meet the needs of American Indian students on and near the reservations in NE Wisconsin, CMN infuses aspects of culture in all coursework, requires two mathematics and science courses (with a lab), increases special education coursework from 3 to 7 credits, and requires field experience in schools with significant numbers of American Indian students. In addition many students are encouraged (NSF grant funding for tuition etc.) to obtain an Associate degree in a STEM field.

CMN's Teacher Education program uses various technology (Computers, i-Pods, i-Pads, Smart Boards, photo and video cameras) with editing and assistive devices for disabled students. The first objective is to have teachers know how to integrate technology in classrooms within subject areas through lesson plans taught/collected in each methods class. Secondly, teachers create e-portfolios to show competency by reflecting on WI DPI's 10 Teacher Standards -- knowledge, skills and dispositions. Each teacher in methods classes uses video to show how they are able to assess children as well as reflecting on their own practice within various subject disciplines. Finally, the Student Teacher then reflects on their own teaching and learning within a clinical situation.
